Review



- Census Day population – 1.811 million
 - Up 7.5 per cent since 2001
- 703,300 households
 - Up 12 per cent since 2001
- Reduction in number of children
- Increase in the number of adults
 - especially the elderly
- Population ageing
 - Median age up from 34 to 37 since 2001

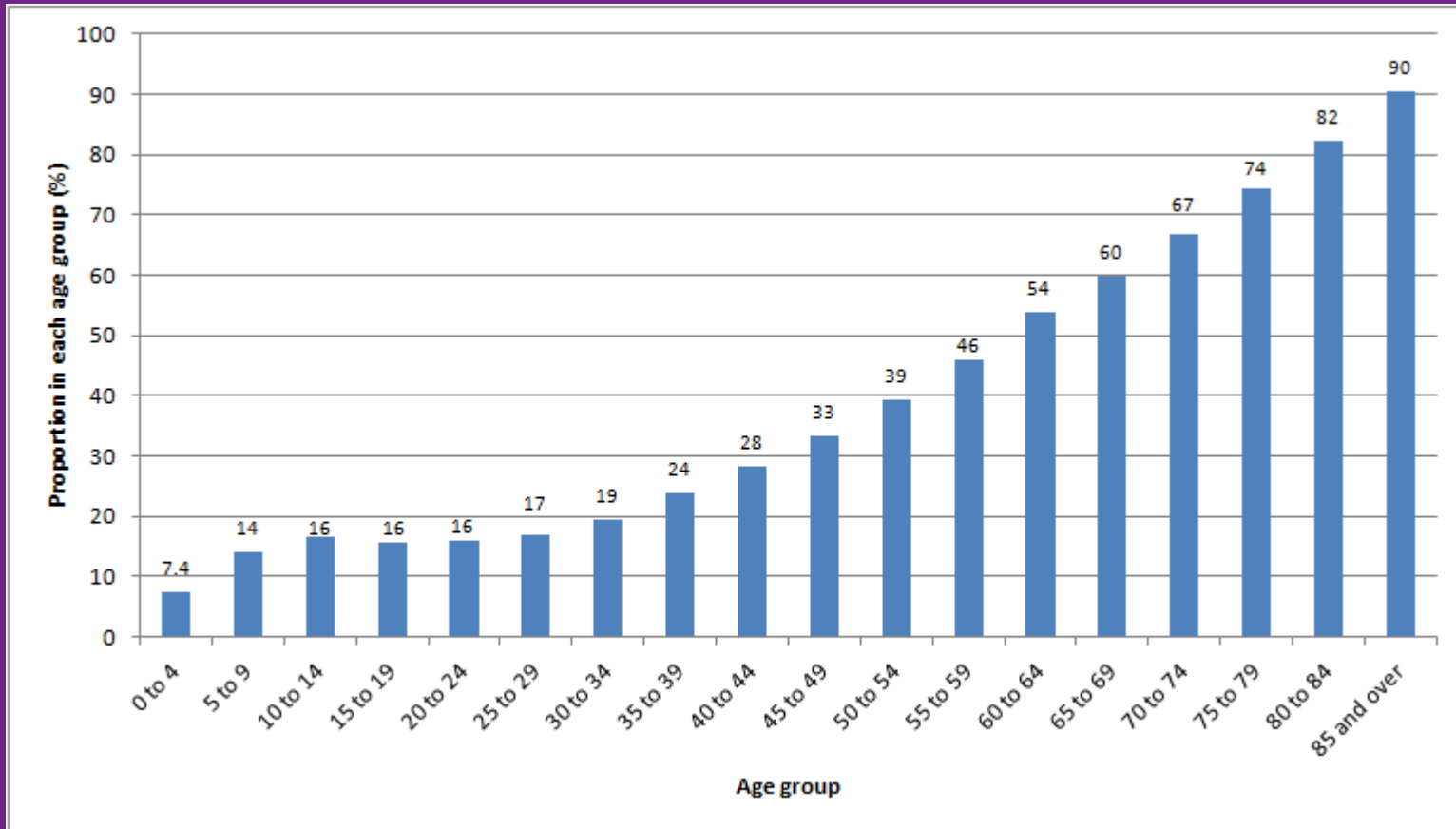

Questions Associated with Health

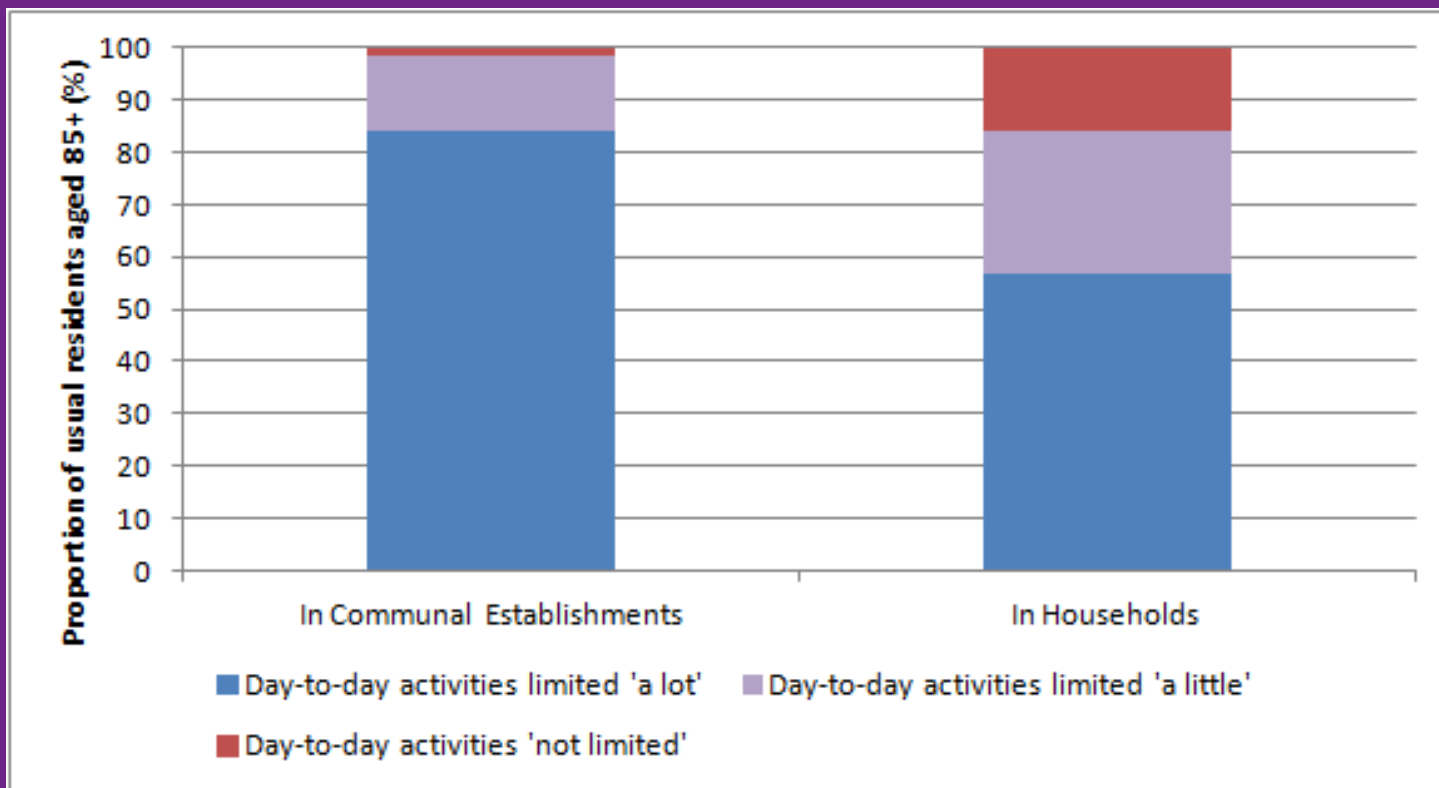


- Do you look after, or give any help or support to family members, friends, neighbours or others because of either:

- Has this accommodation been designed or adapted?

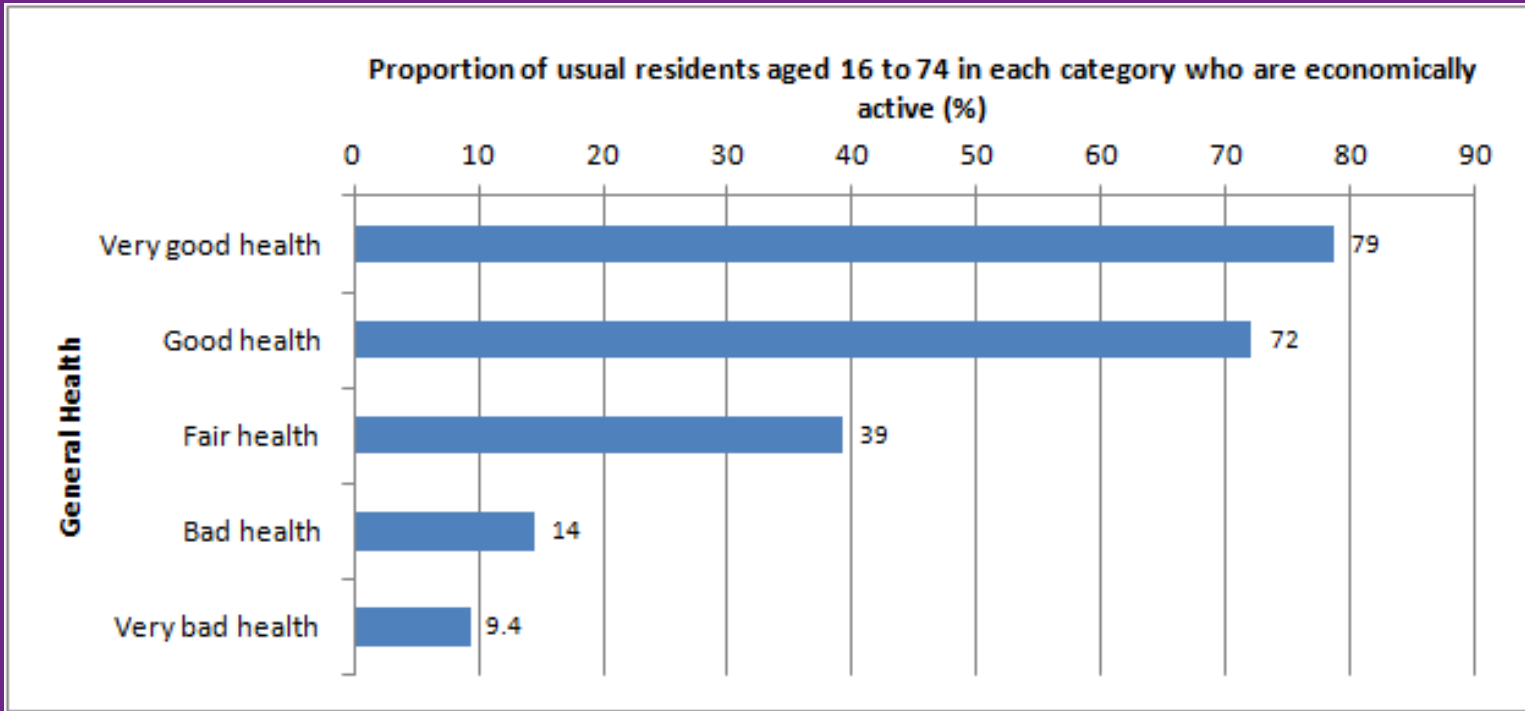
Proportion of those in each age group with a long-term condition



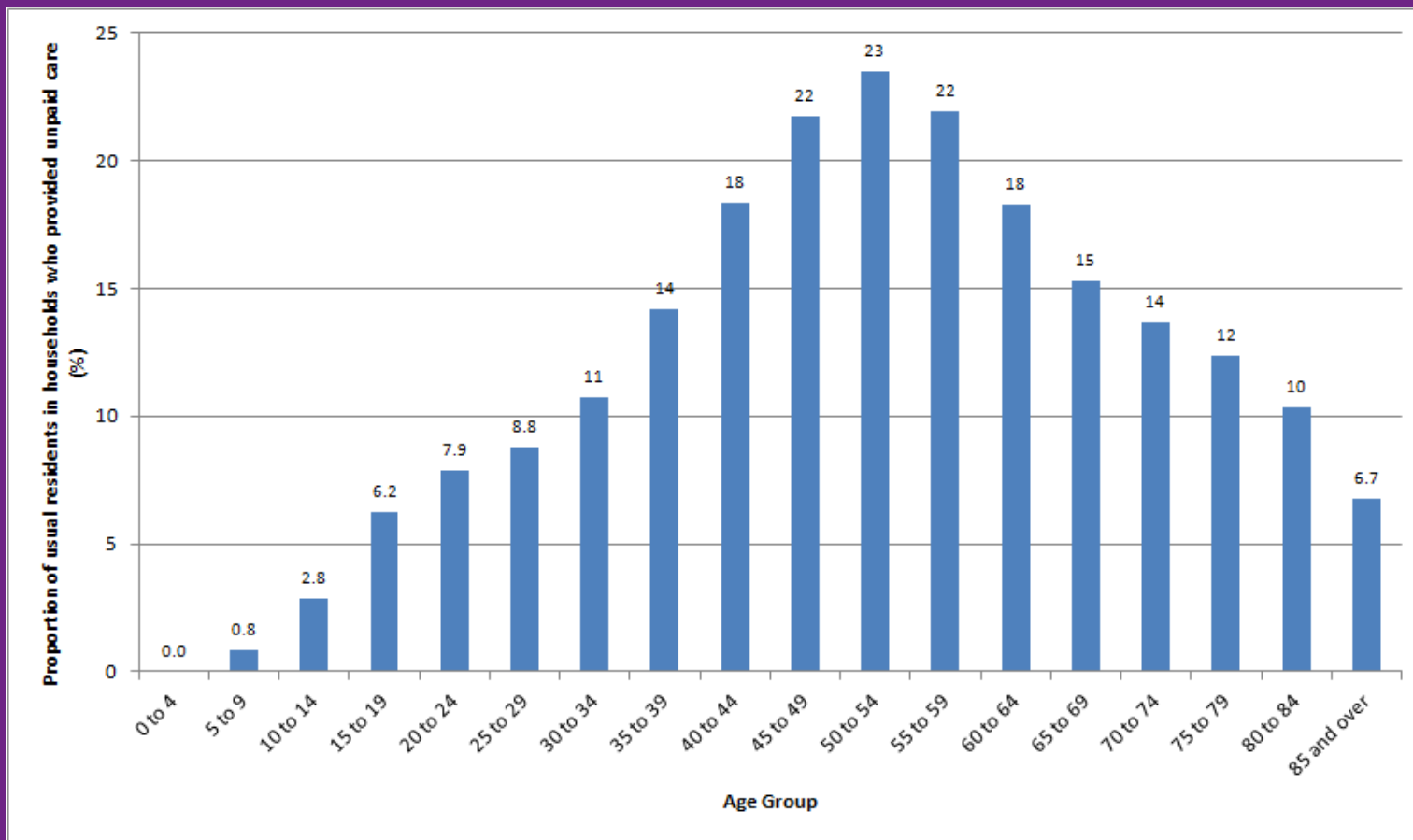
Long-term health problem or disability for residents aged 85+ in Households or Communal Establishments



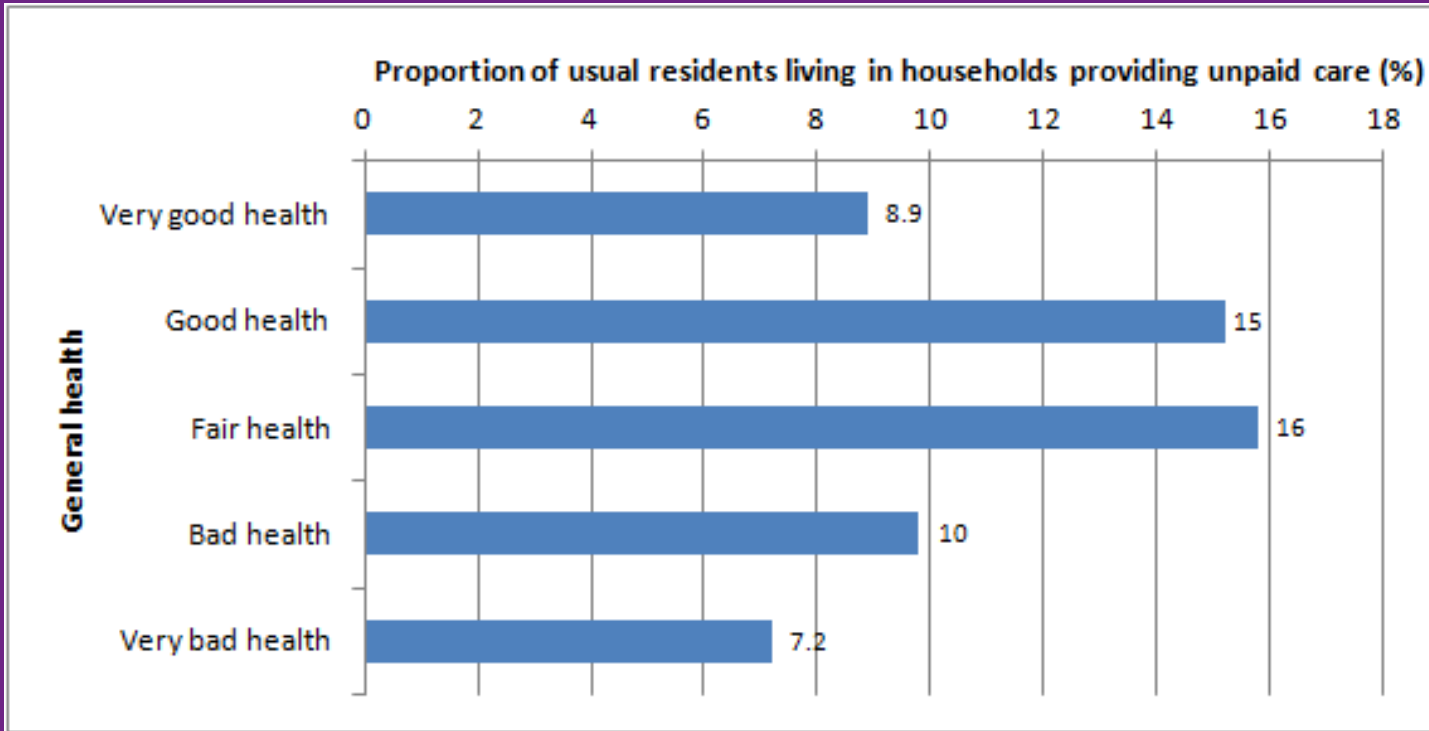
General Health by Economic Activity for all usual residents aged 16 to 74



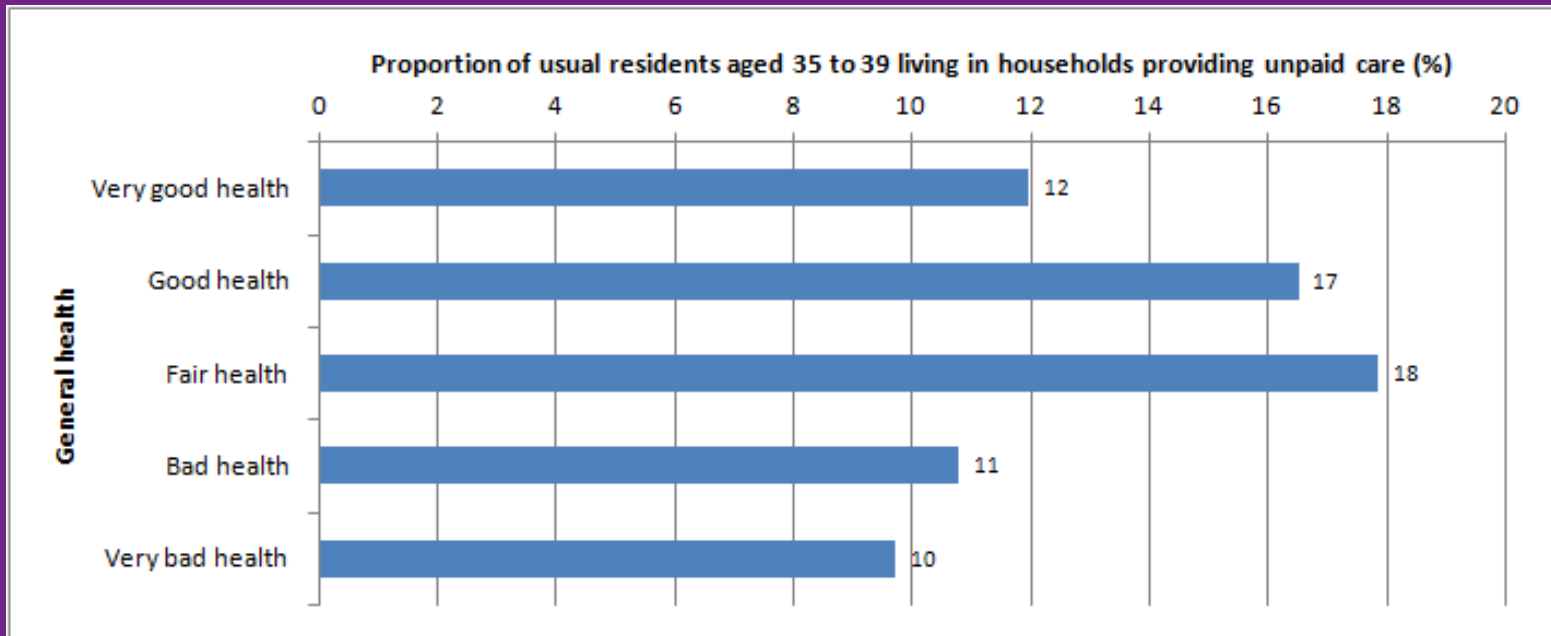
Provision of Unpaid Care by Age (residents in households)



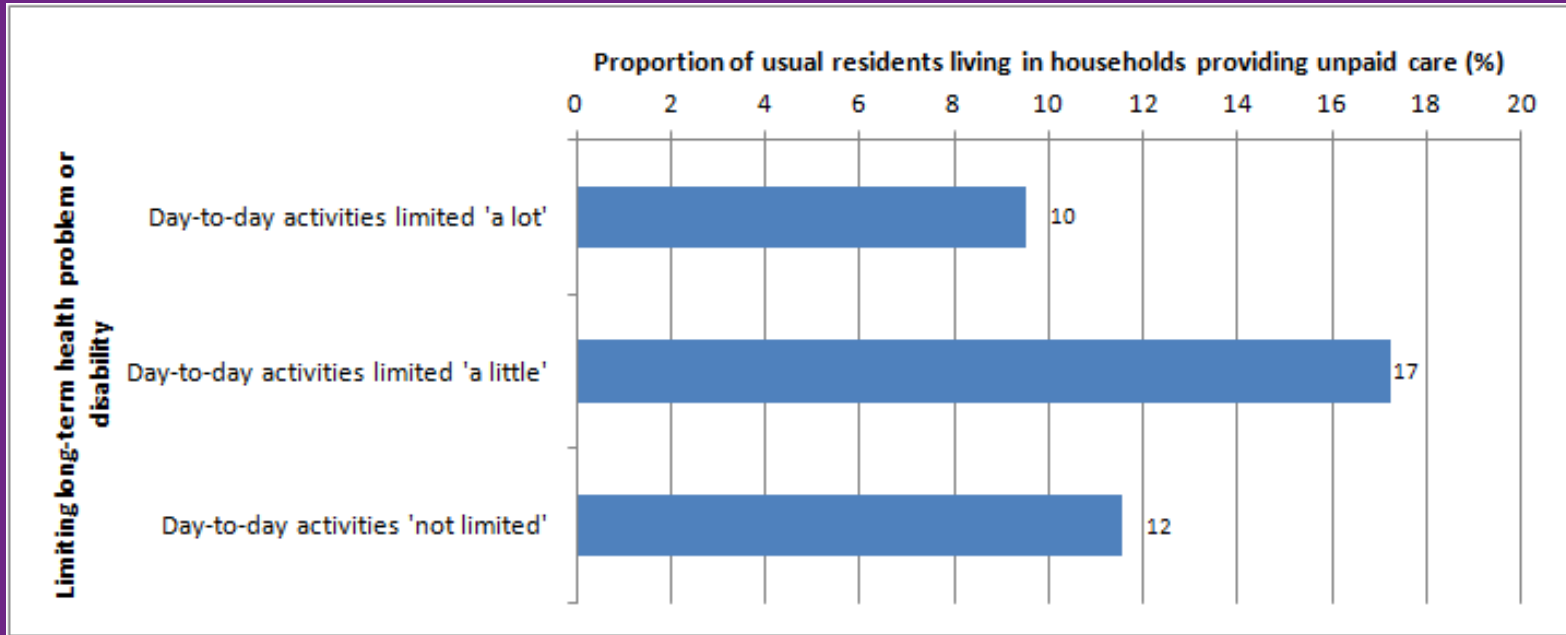
General health by provision of unpaid care for all usual residents living in households



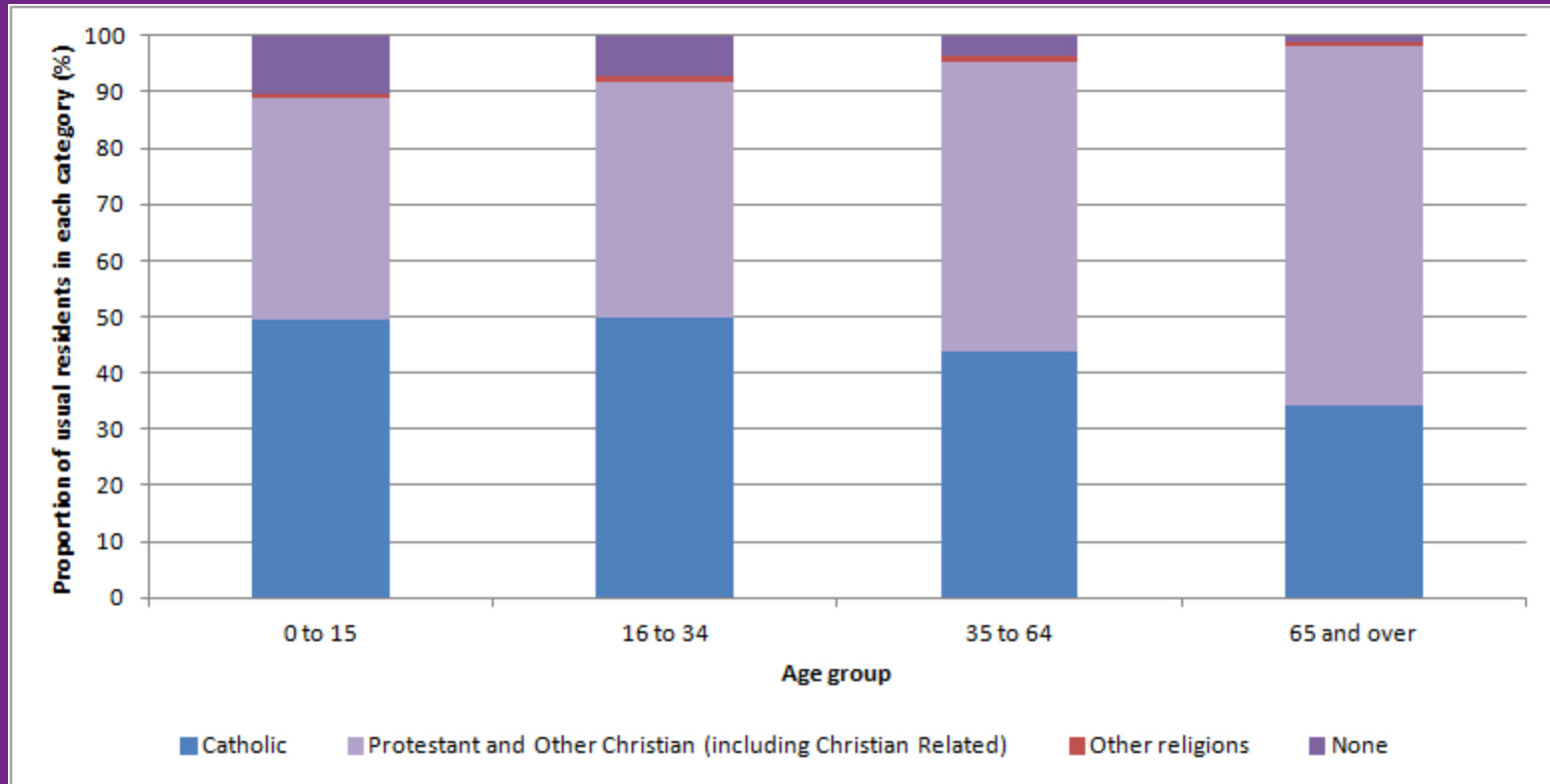
General health by provision of unpaid care for usual residents aged 35 to 39 living in households



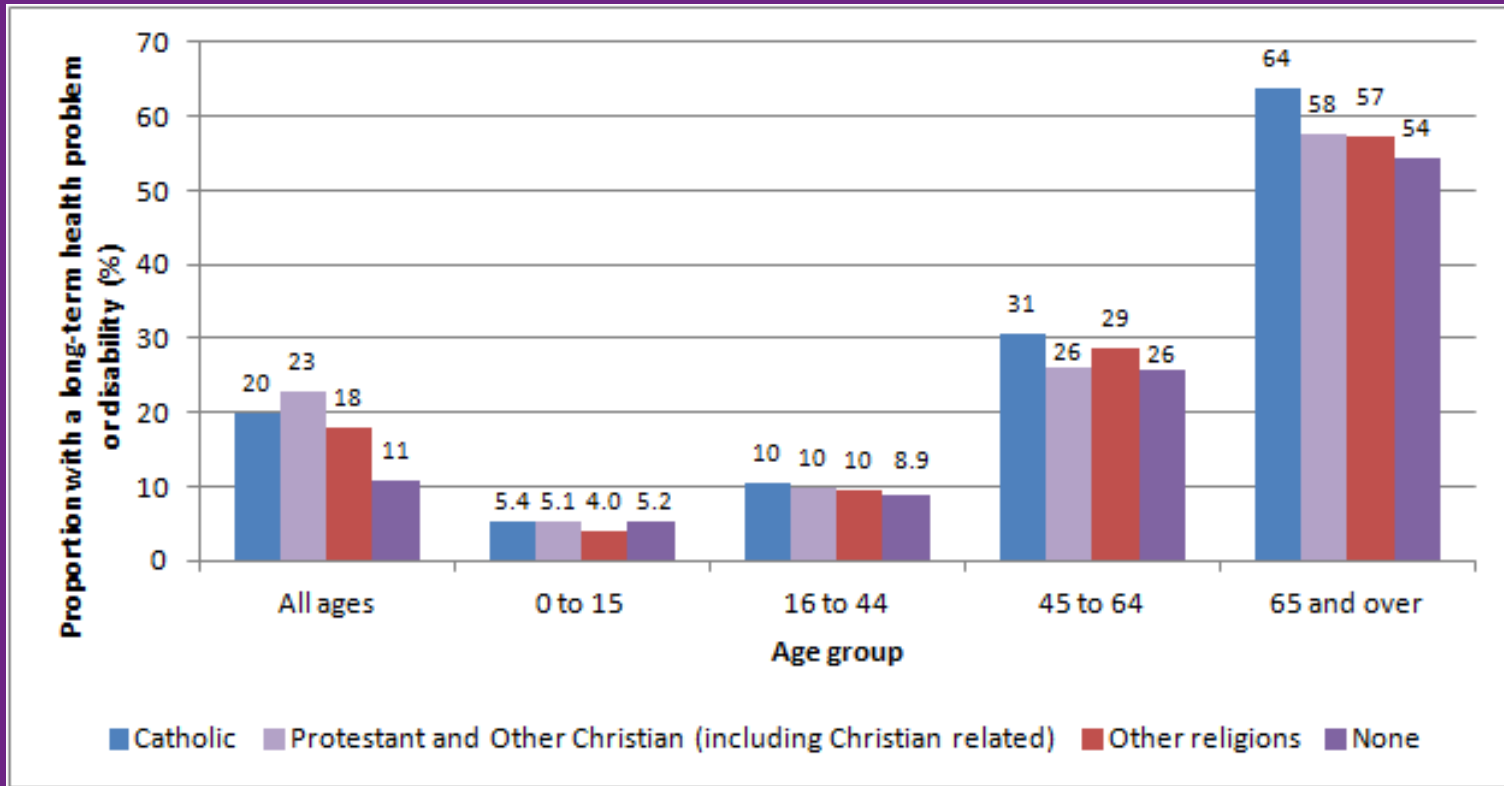
Limiting long-term health problem or disability for all usual residents living in households by provision of unpaid care

Proportion of people with a long-term health problem or disability which limited day-to-day activities, disaggregated by Age Group and Religion





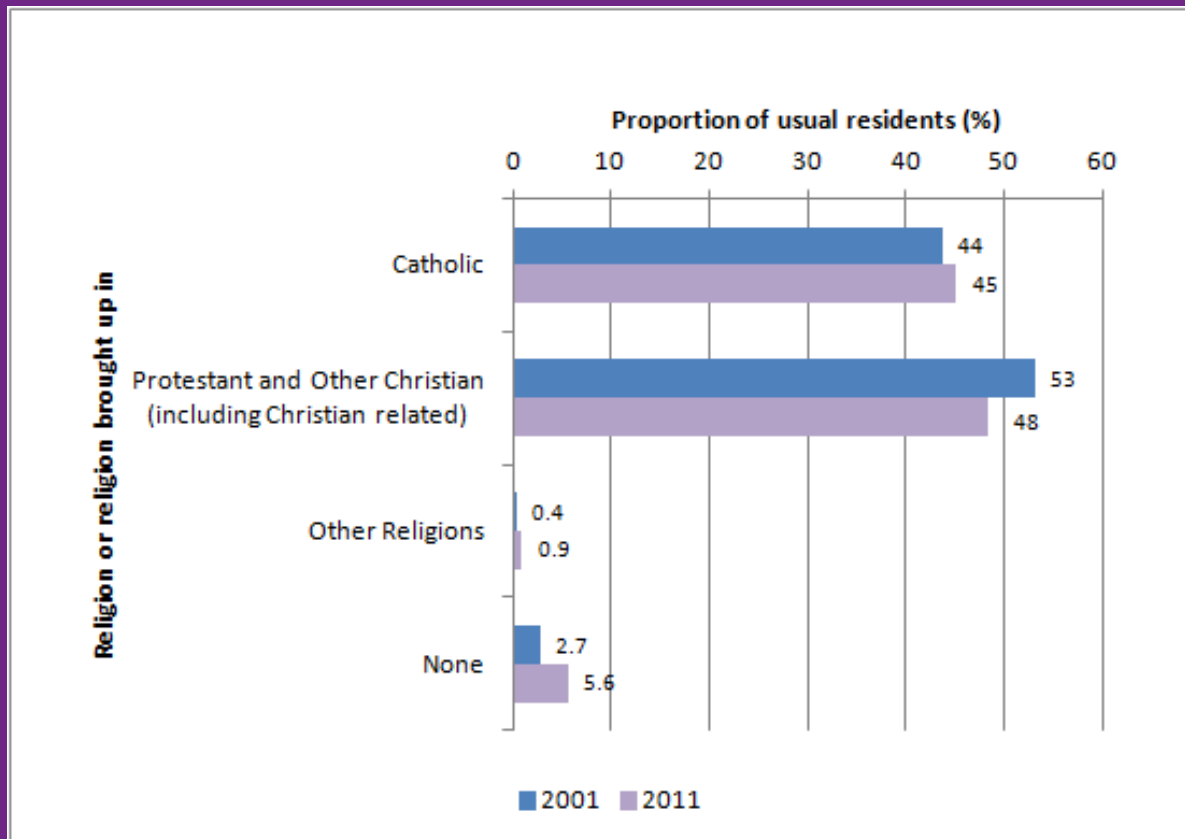

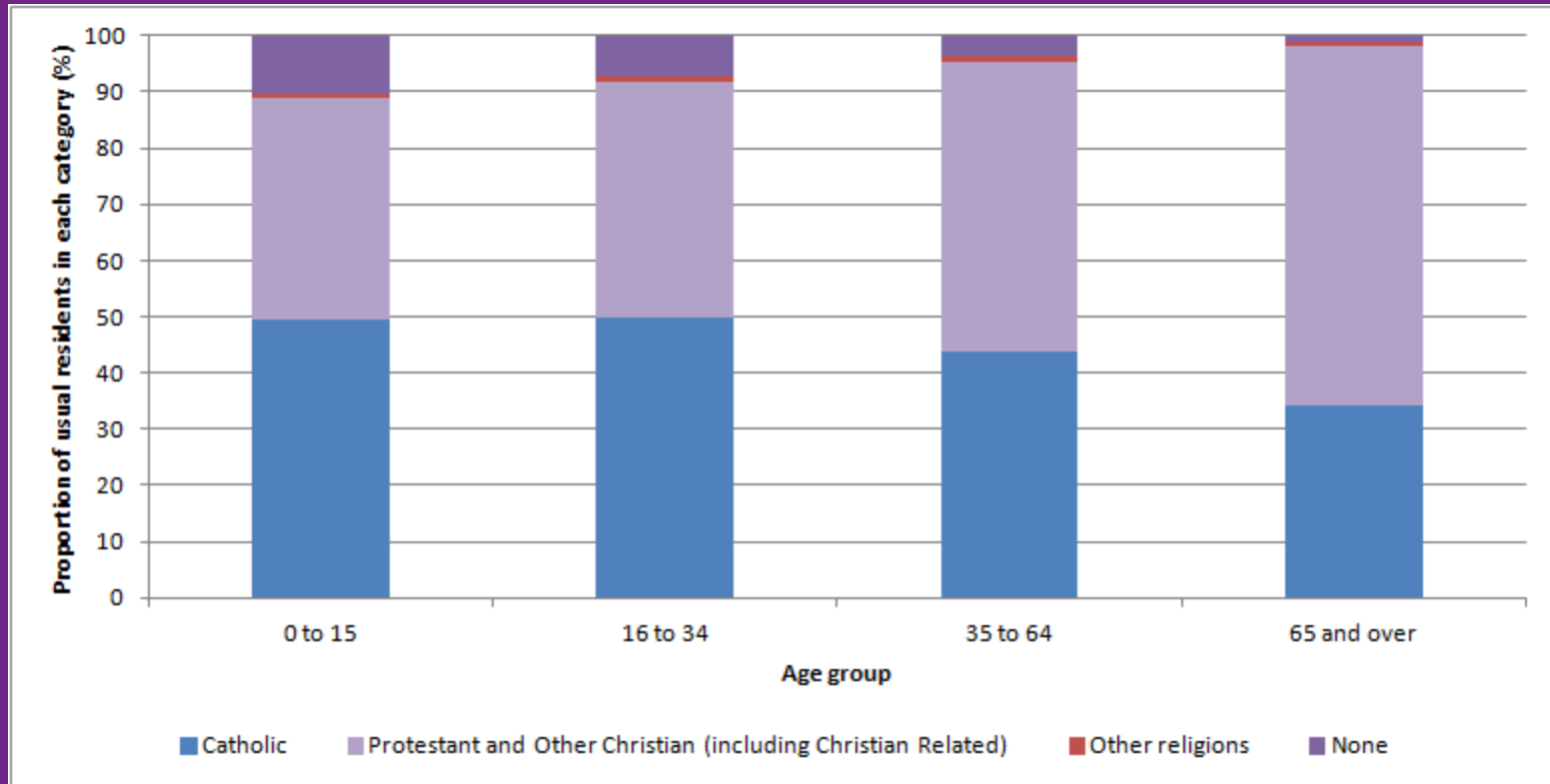

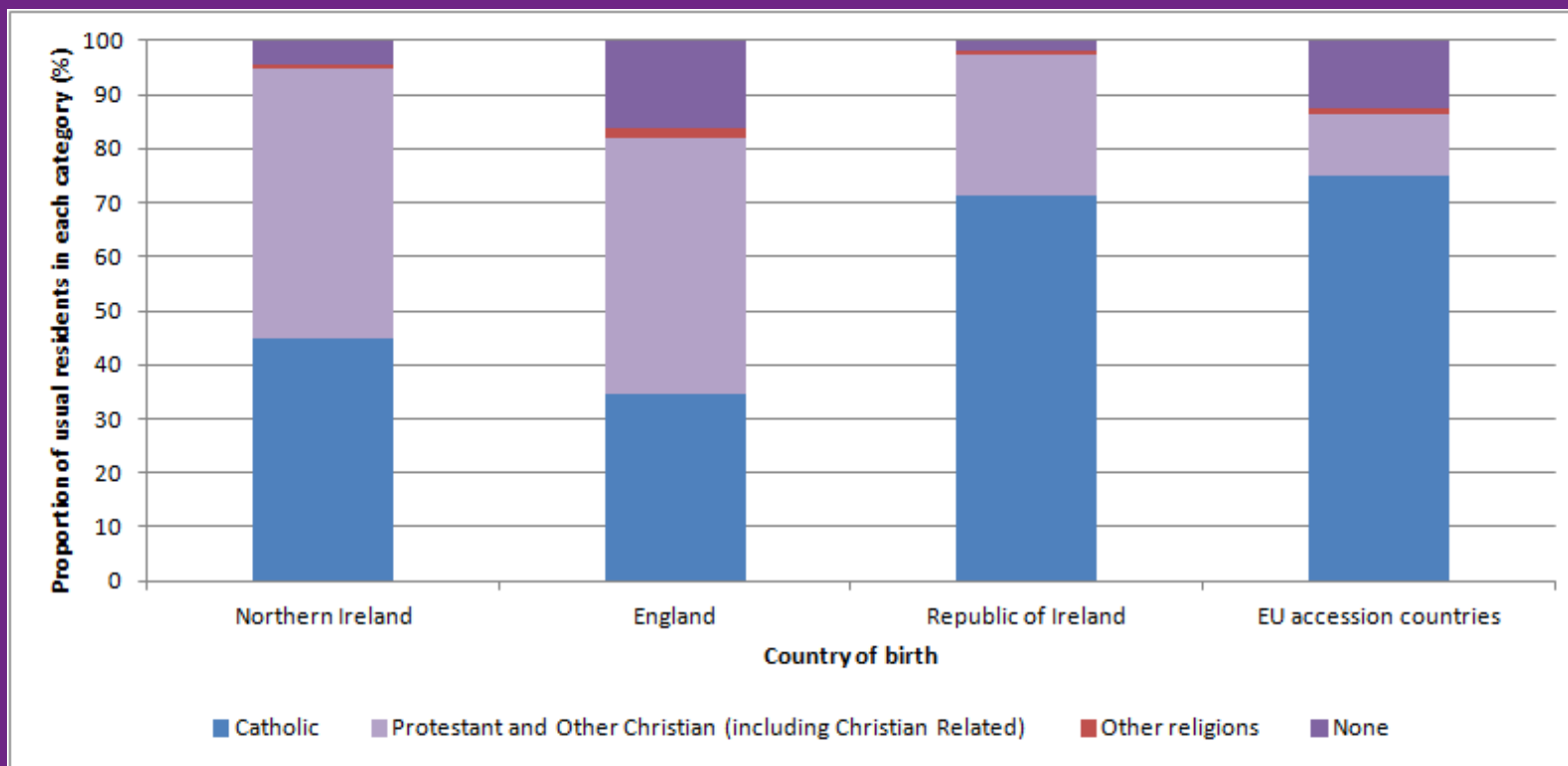
Religion or religion brought up in of all usual residents (2001 and 2011 Censuses)



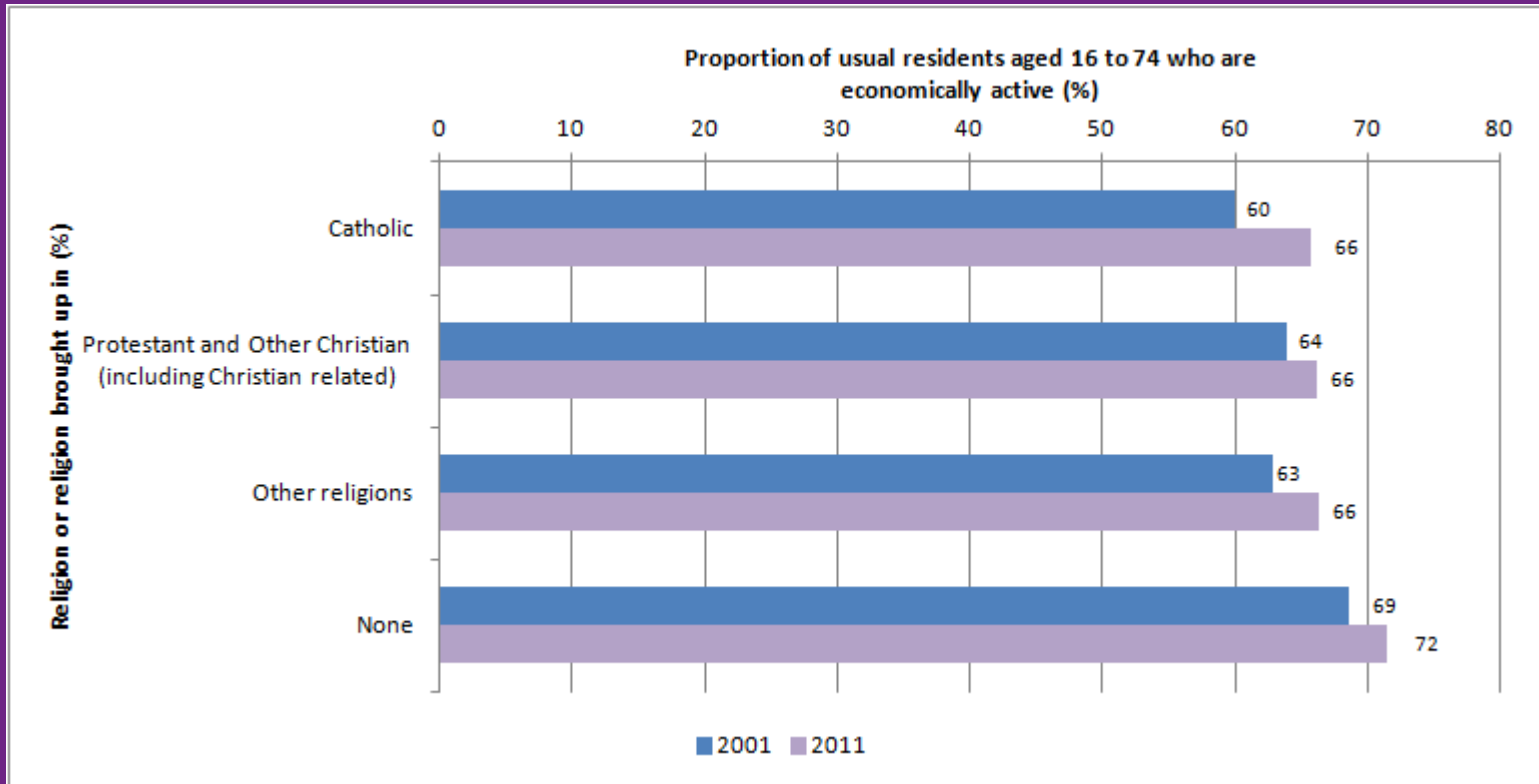
Age group by religion or religion brought up in



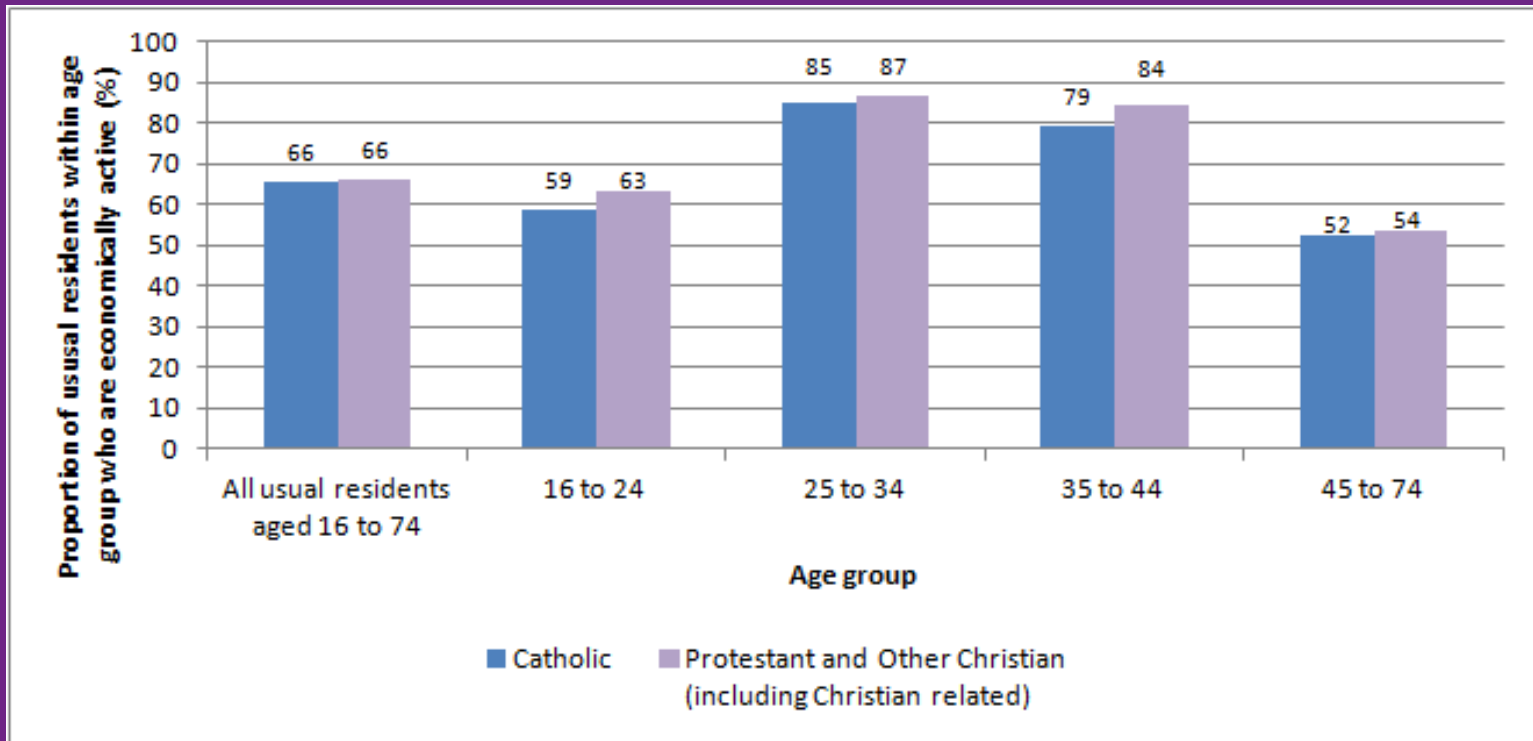
Selected countries of birth by religion or religion brought up in



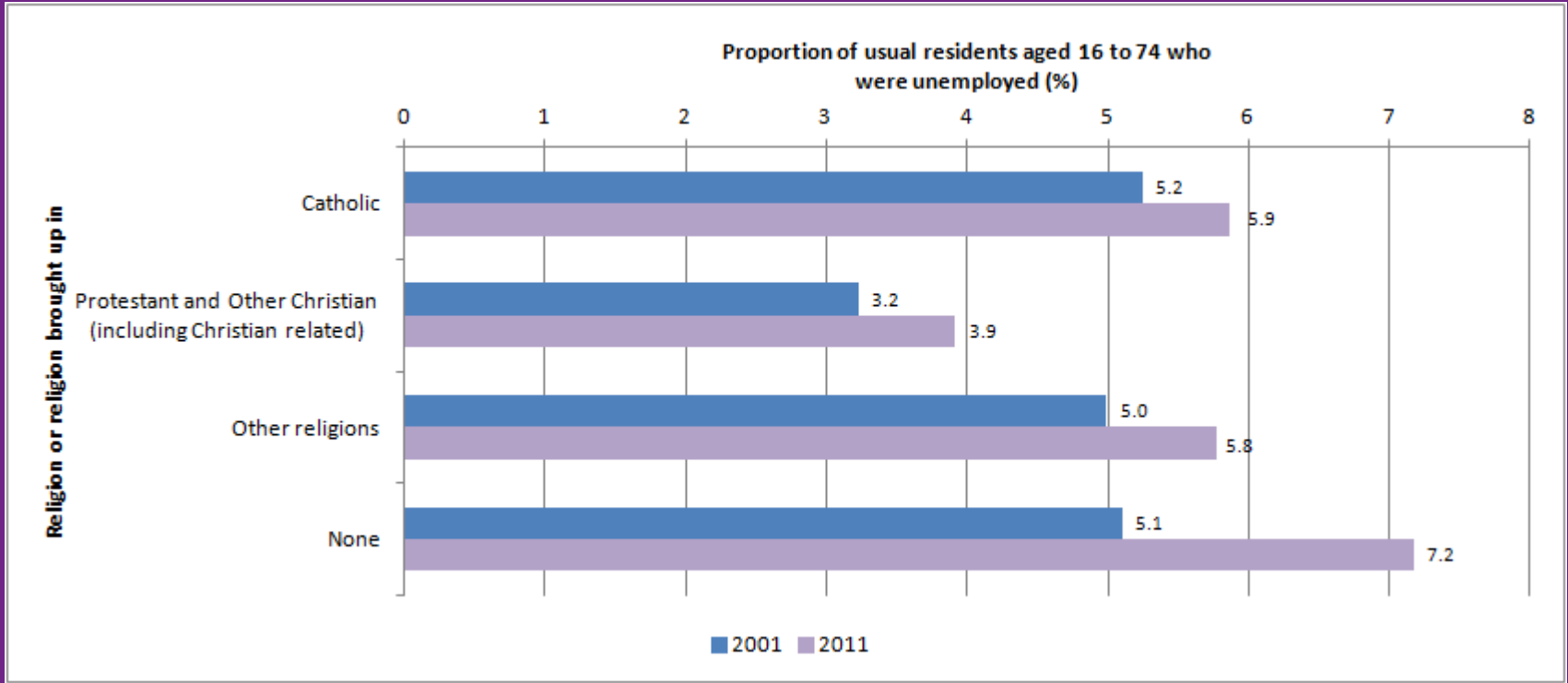
Economic activity rates by religion or religion brought up in (2001 and 2011 Censuses)



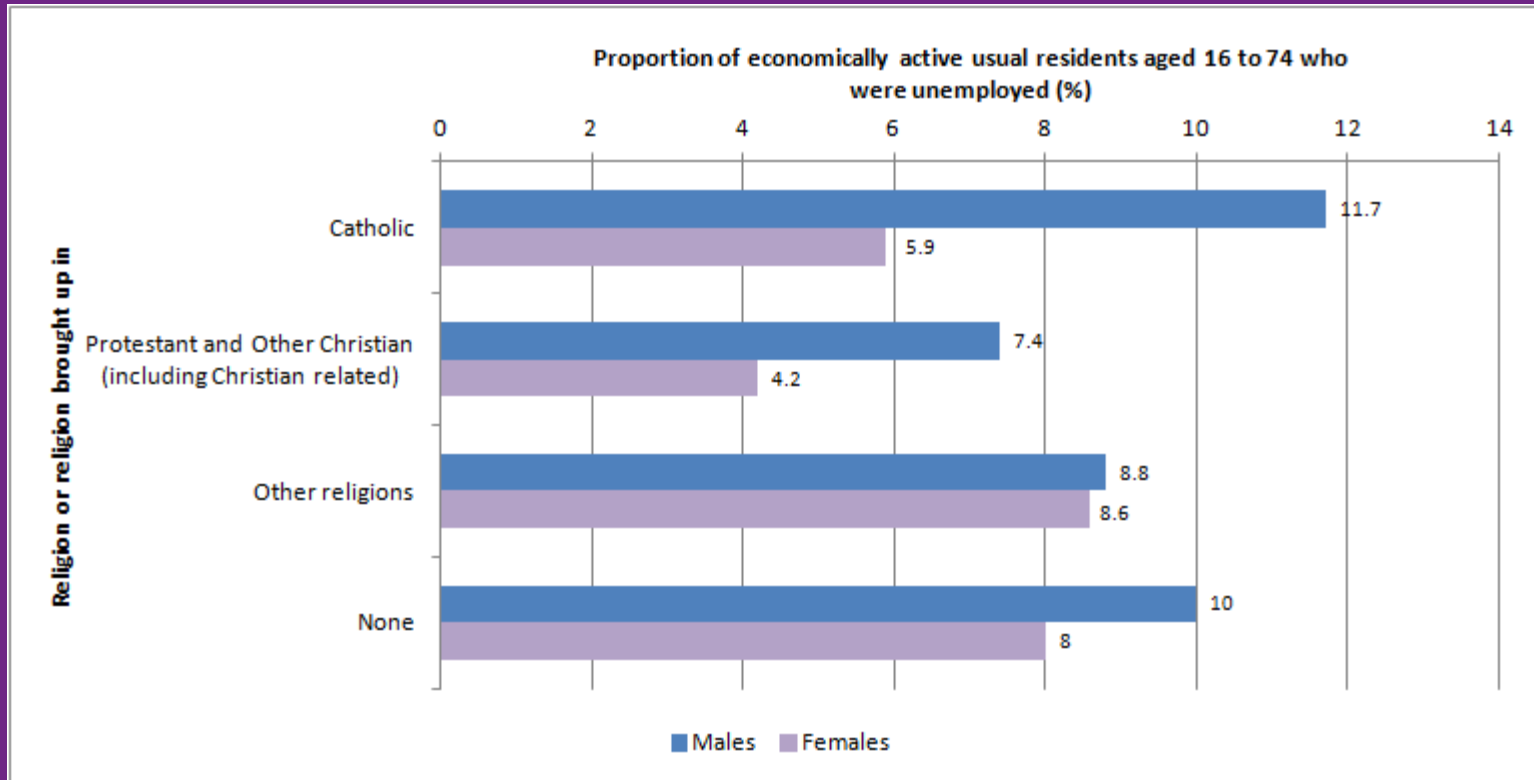
Economic activity rates by religion or religion brought up in by age



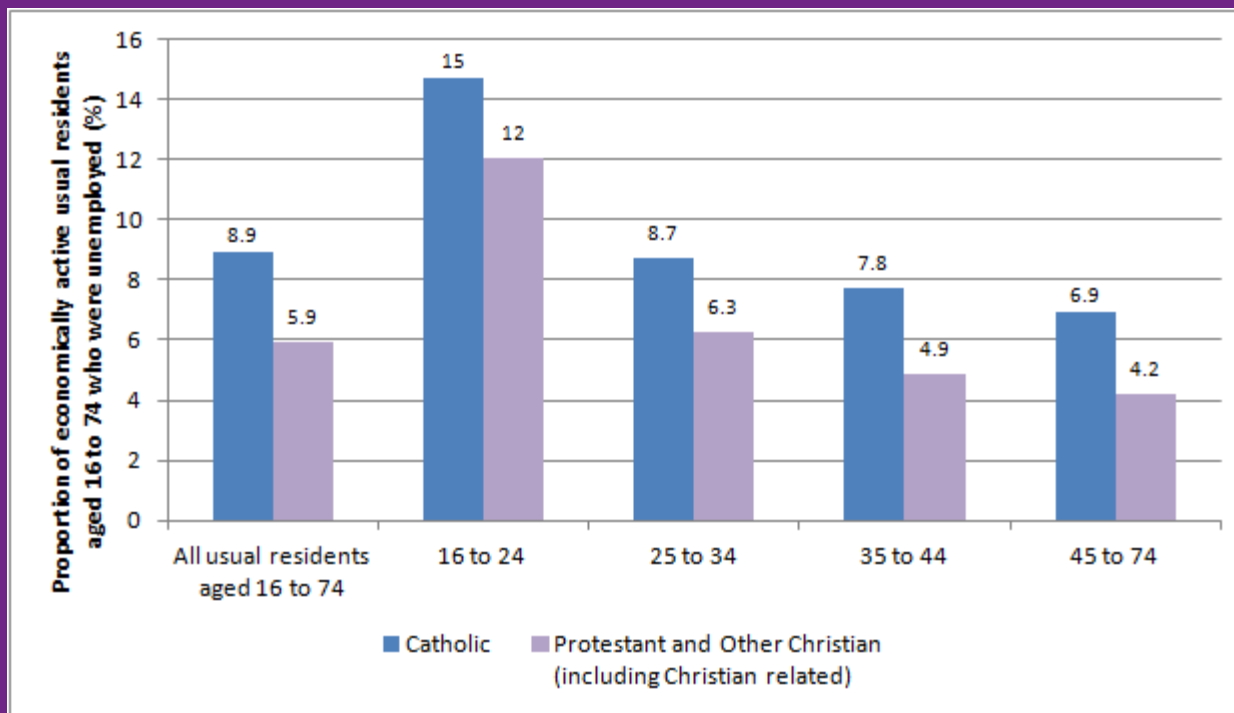
Proportion of usual residents aged 16 to 74 who were unemployed by religion or religion brought up in (2001 and 2011 Censuses)



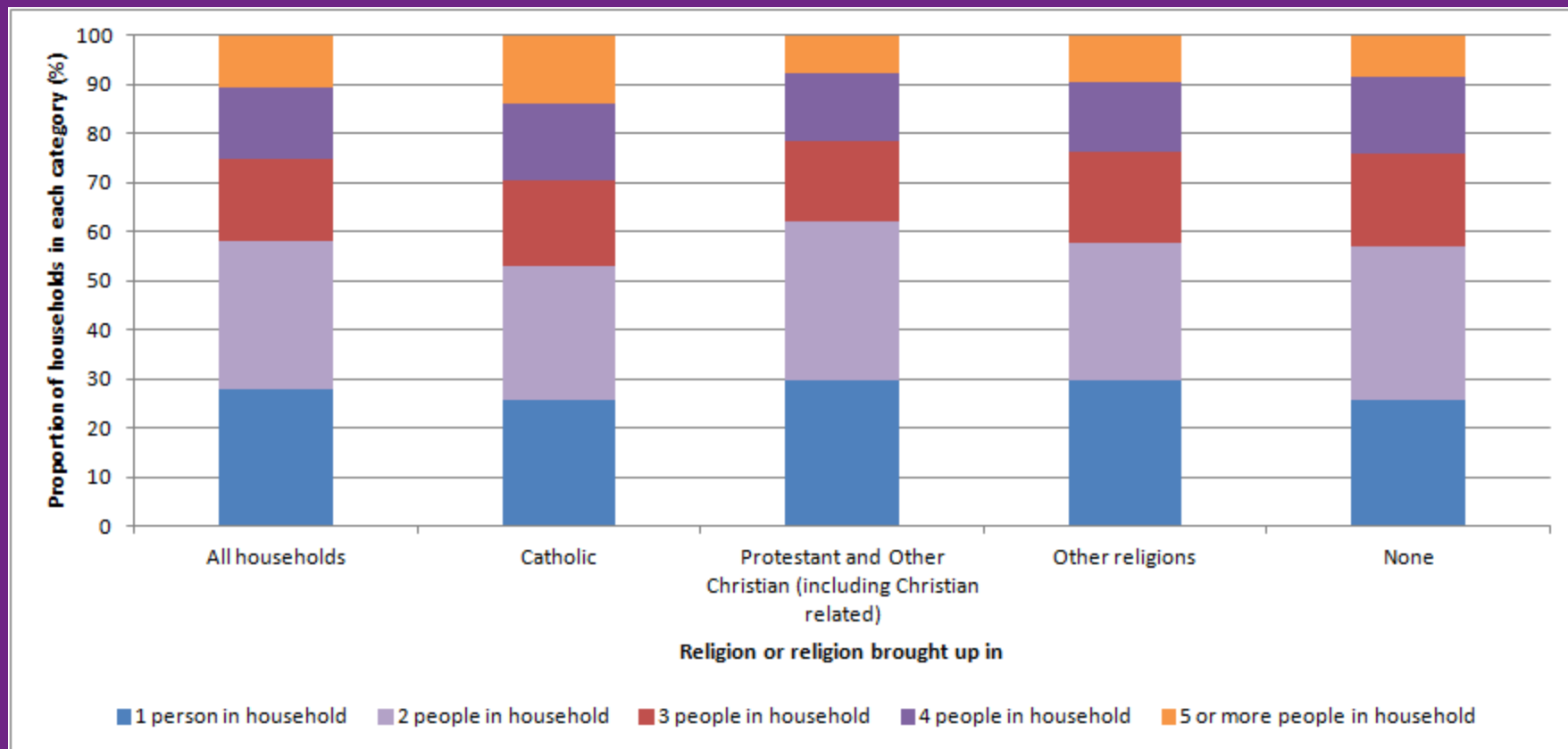
Unemployment rates by religion or religion brought up in by sex



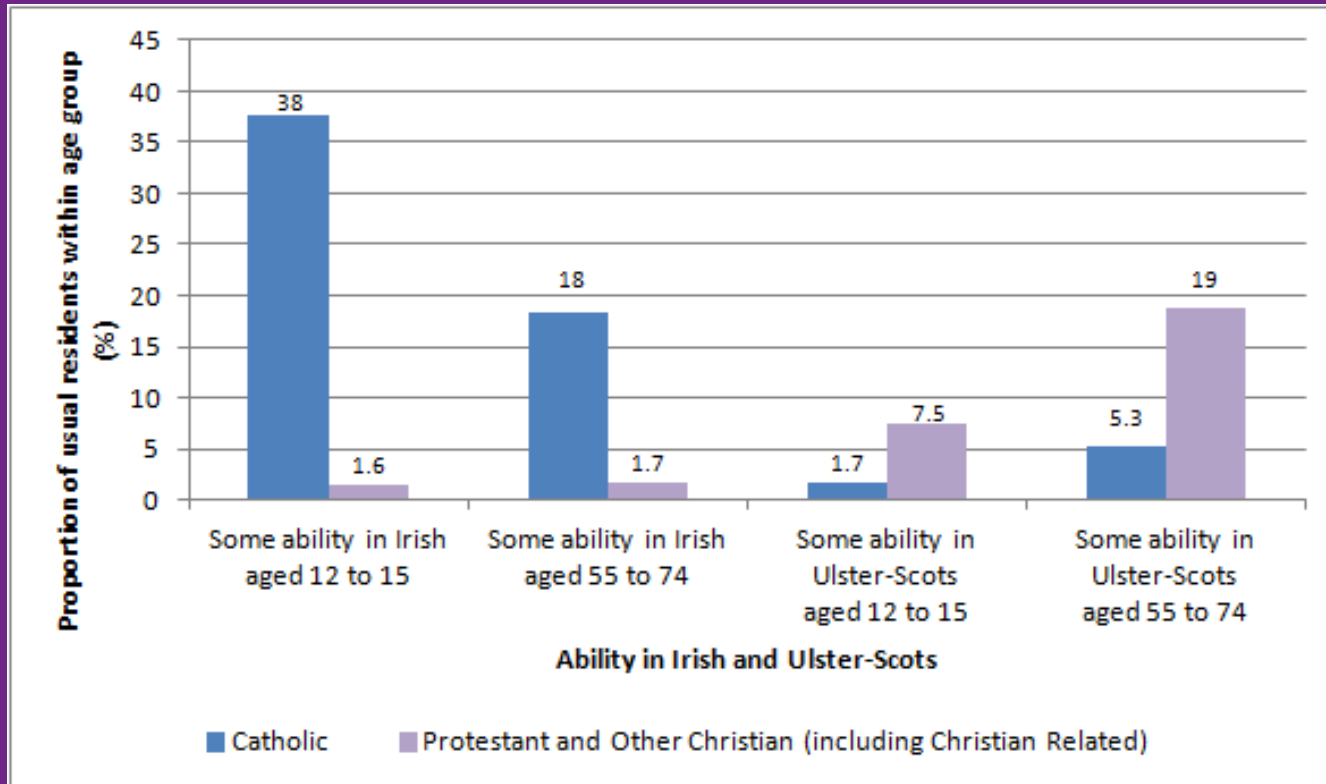
Unemployment rates by religion or religion brought up in by age

Ability in Irish and Ulster-Scots by religion or religion brought up in among usually resident Catholics and Protestants aged 12 to 15 and 55 to 74





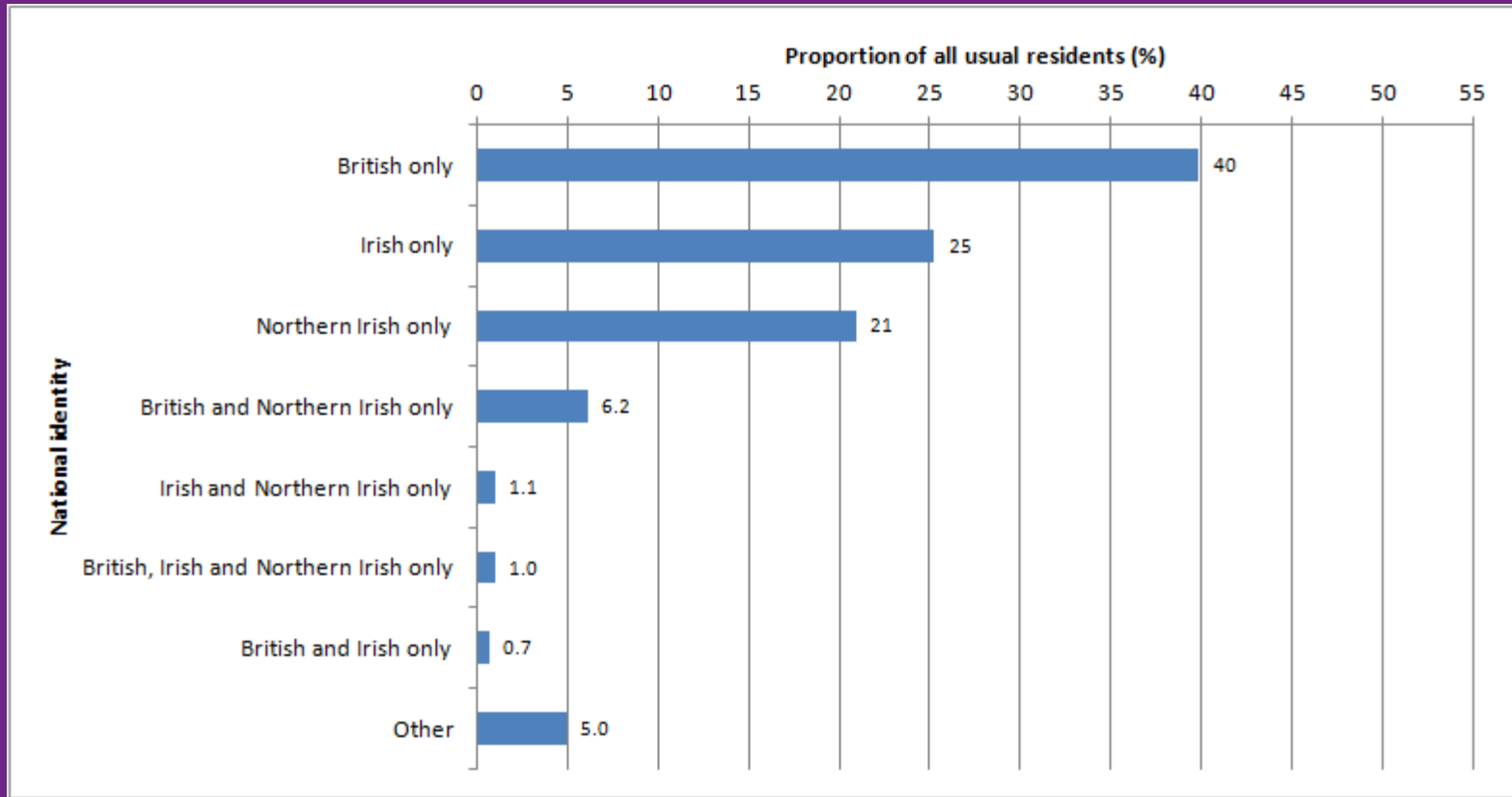

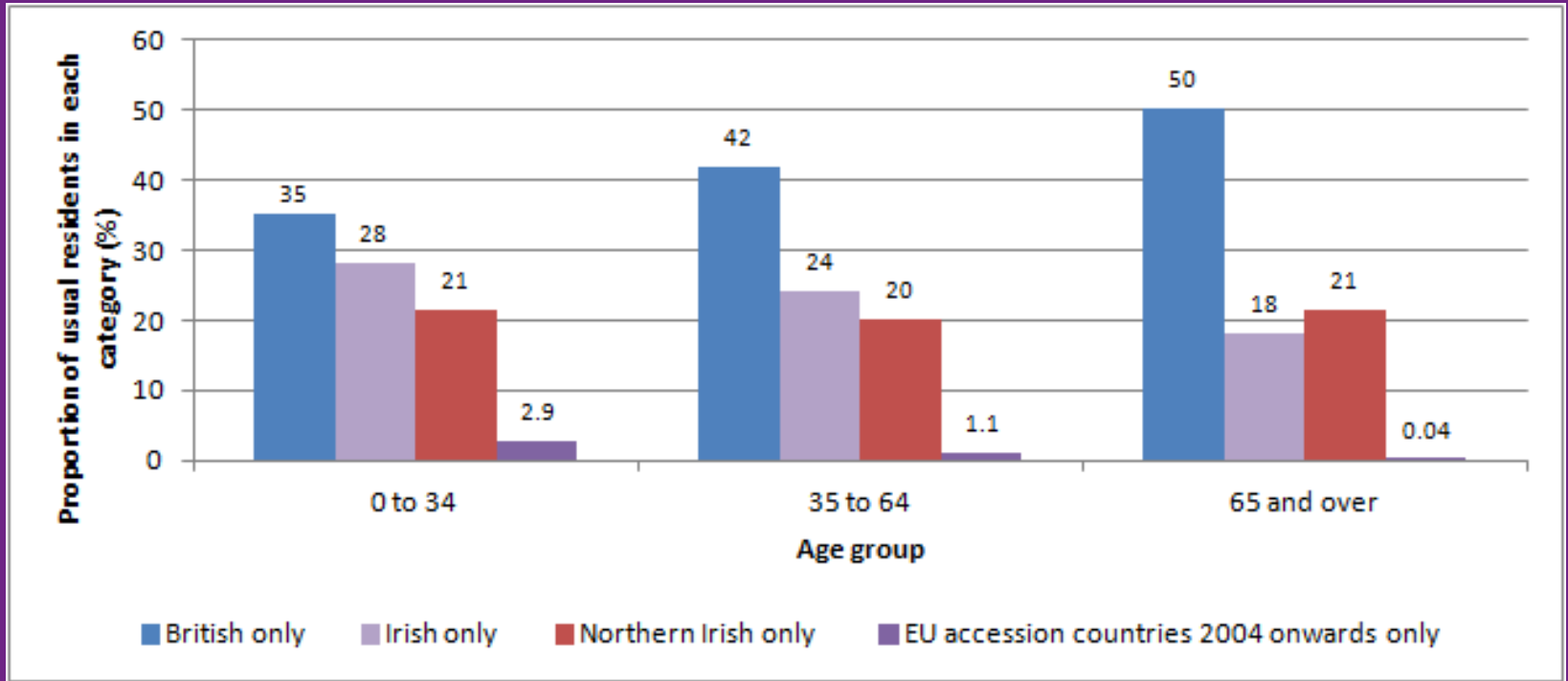

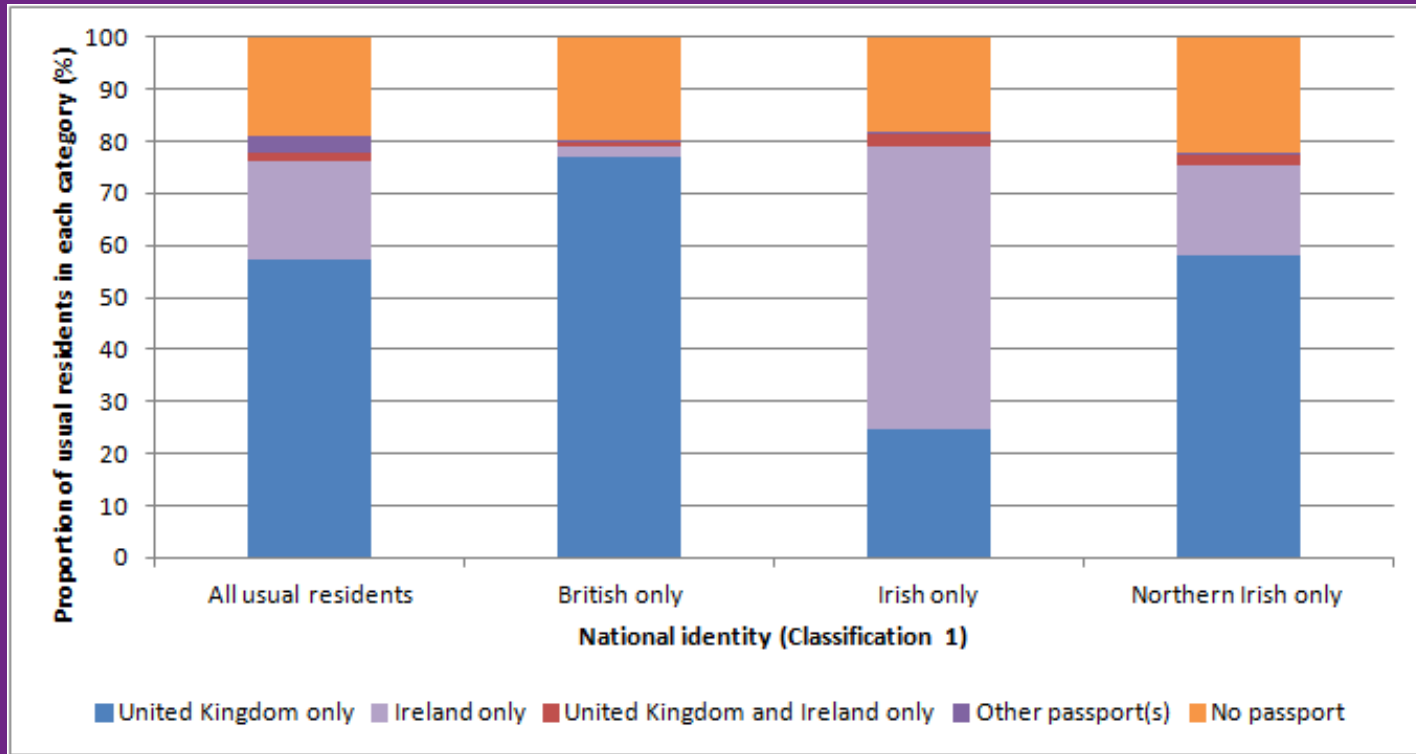
National identity of all usual residents (Classification 1)



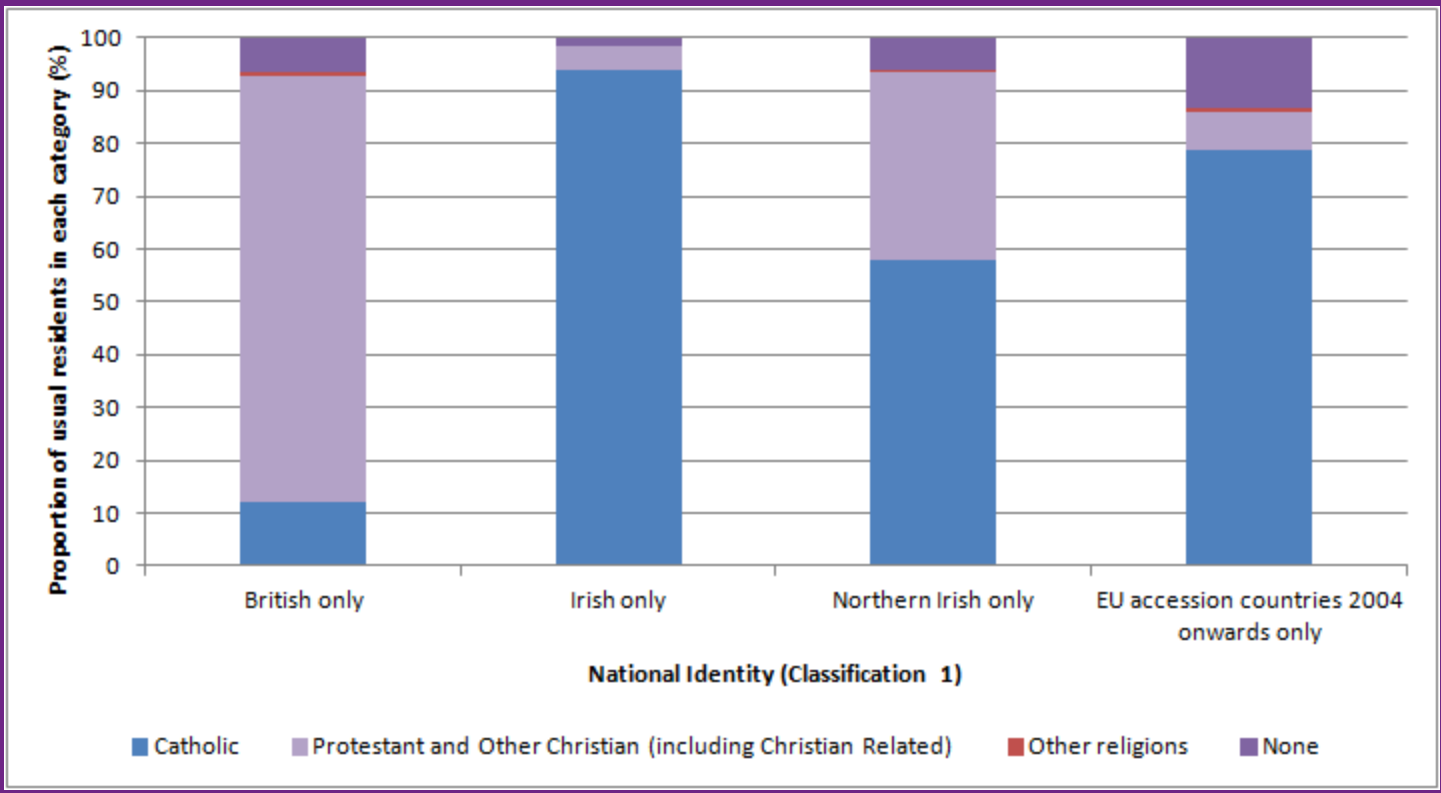
Age group by selected national identity (Classification 1)



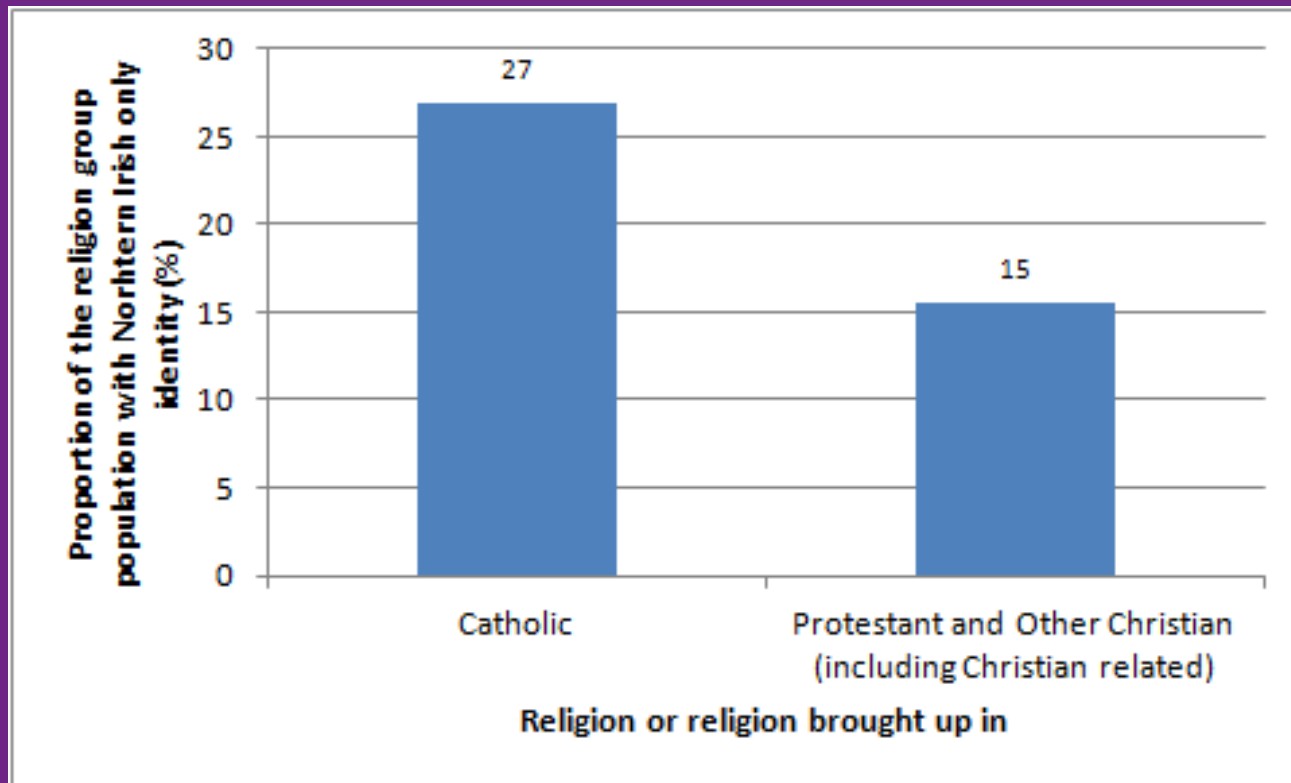
Selected national identity (Classification 1) by passports held



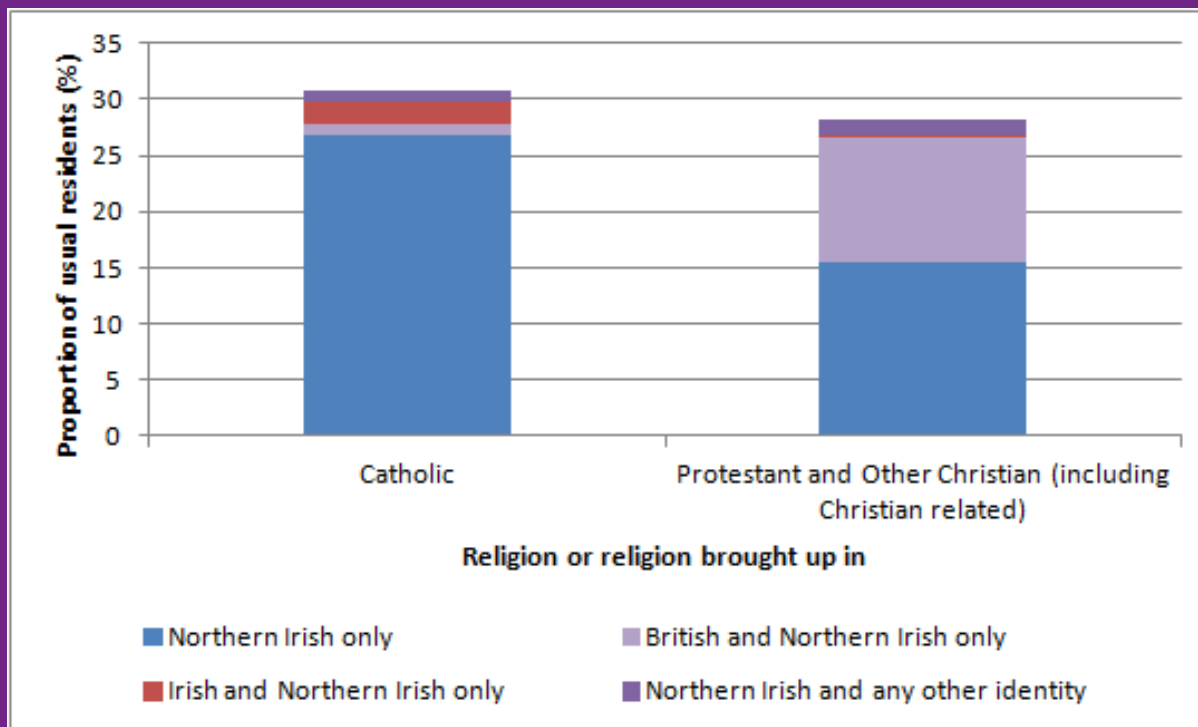
Selected national identity (Classification 1) by religion or religion brought up in



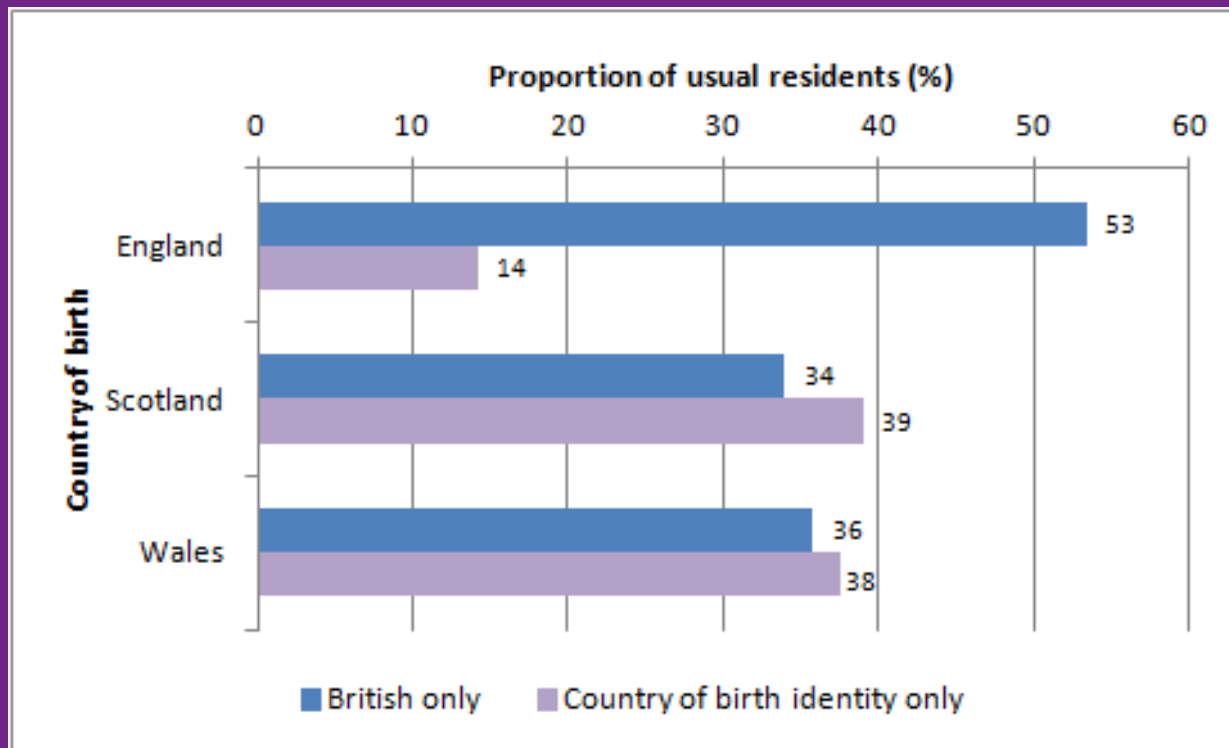
Religion or religion brought up in by national identity (Classification 1)
