	Mr McDonagh welcomed everyone to the meeting, noting in particular the representatives from the Business Community.	
	Apologies were received from Derek Bond, SAC Member, and Stephen Kelly, Manufacturing NI.	
2.	Role of SAC	
	Mr McDonagh gave an overview of SAC, and explained that the purpose of this meeting, which is part of an ongoing engagement between SAC and the representative business bodies in Northern Ireland, was to share the work that NISRA staff have been doing on EU Exit and also to discuss the burden on business of complying with statutory statistical returns.	

## 3. **Overview of EU exit Analysis** Secretary to send link of the EU statistics publication to Dr James Gillan presented the committee with the ongoing work on the EU exit analysis. This gave an overview of Northern Ireland's current trade with Great Britain, business Ireland, Rest of the European Union and Rest of the World and included: representatives and SAC members. Analysis of NI external sales and exports by destination Value of imports and exports by broad destination and product Characteristics of NI businesses by value of exports Dr Gillan highlighted informational constraints in terms of data sources for trade in services, cross border supply chains and embedded services. He also presented an overview of research carried out on migration and people movement in Northern Ireland including analysis of migrant workers. 4.
