











# Stats Authority - Strengthening User Engagement

"The value of the statistics produced lies in their usefulness, and in their eventual use...in ways that promote the public good."

"The use and utility of statistics should drive the development of the service. It must be the basis for all decisions about:

- which statistical outputs to produce
- the form they should take
- the balance between the resources devoted to their collection and the resources given to supporting their use."


## Targeting Investment – Demographics User Group

# Targeting Investment – 450 new Sainsbury's stores since release of 2001 Census data




Customised Gravity Model – includes Census data on: resident & daytime populations; single & older person households; social grade; origin-destination; car availability

# **Market Research / Data Analytics**

#### Our work without Census Data

- Where would we get our sample frames from
  - To the same level of detail / accuracy / completeness?
- How would we set quotas?
- How would we know how many people to interview in each local area (clustering)?
- ...and of each demographic group (stratification)?
- How could we weight our data so that it most accurately reflect the population?
  - Especially critical for on-line surveys
- If we cannot weight our data, then any results we produce would not be accurate.
- ...and this carried forward to any "value-add" statistical analyses we carry out

# Census Benefits – Local Examples

### Resource allocation

- Barnett Formula
  - ➤ allocation of marginal resources on a comparable basis requires
    accurate population estimates at all levels of geography for each UK
    country
- Weighted Capitation Formula
  - ➤ <u>DHSSPS</u> uses this to determine fair allocation of available resources by area, based on population and relative need across nine care programmes
- Health and Social Care Inequalities Monitoring System
  - DHSSPS uses this to assess area differences across a range of health outcomes covering mortality, morbidity, utilisation of & access to services





# Census Benefits – Local Examples

## Funding bids

- Voluntary and community sector
  - ➤ <u>Volunteer Now</u> has used the new voluntary activity outputs to espouse the value of volunteering

## Service planning

- Northern Ireland Transport Model
  - ➤ <u>Transport NI</u> has been supplied with bespoke, aggregated Travel to Work and Place of Study Data at Small Area level
- Future Housing Need
  - > NIHE has commissioned research drawing on demographic trends





#### **Census Benefits – Local Examples**

- Policy making and monitoring
  - Impact of Welfare Reform
    - ▶ <u>DSD</u> has used 2011 Census data in 'grossing up' Family Resources Survey data, the information source for the Policy Simulation Model used to model the impact of Welfare Reform
    - Kinship Care
      - ➤ <u>DHSSPS</u> has used 2011 Census Commissioned tables to produce the report 'Kinship care – Children Living in Households without a Parent Present Northern Ireland 2011'.
- Equality and diversity assessments
  - Racial Equality Strategy
    - ➢ OFMdFM is using 2011 Census data to develop an algorithm designed to supplement / boost data on minority ethnic groups and migrants gathered through surveys / admin sources





#### **Census Benefits – Local Examples**

- Social and academic research
  - NI Longitudinal Study (NILS) & NI Mortality Study (NIMS)
    - Census essential to NILS development uniquely collects required data through time and at relevant individual, household and spatial scales
    - > 26 research projects incorporating 2011 Census data have been approved by the NILS Research Approval Group, e.g.
      - national identity and religion affiliation through time
      - housing tenure, residential mobility and health transitions
      - in / out migration from rural areas
      - PhD projects





#### **Census Benefits – Local Examples**

- Regional and / or local comparisons
  - Impacts at lower geographies and for small populations;
    - DCAL has used 2011 Census data to identify Gaeltacht areas and Ulster Scots homelands
- Benchmark for other data sources
  - Labour Force Survey
    - DFP has used 2011 Census population estimates by five-year age-breakdown at LGD level, as well as population projections derived from them, within the weighting methodology for the LFS
  - The Cost of Poor Housing
    - ➢ NIHE commissioned modelling work based on data from House Condition Survey and 2011 Census





# 2011 Census – Examples of Successes

- Working closely with ONS and NRS
- More widespread user consultation / engagement
- Administrative Post out-Post back, Online collection, Field Operations
- Statistical Census Under Enumeration Project, Address Register
- No post-tabular statistical disclosure control (internally additive & consistent)
- Harmonised univariate statistics published on same dates as ONS
- More pre-canned outputs than in 2001 new variables & additional geographies
- Enhanced data access, visualisation, analysis, metadata & quality assurance re-launched NINIS, infographics, interactive graphs, bulletins & reports






# 2011 Census – Challenges to Build On

- Outputs timetable should be shorter
- Statistical Disclosure Control was a bottleneck and restricted outputs
- Need for greater flexibility for users in terms of table building data cubes from which tables can be built and fewer pre-canned outputs
- Need for greater harmonisation of cross-tabular outputs
- The proportion completing the Census online needs to increase importance of digital inclusion strategy
- Building on data sharing, address register, administrative data

# 'Beyond 2011' project

- Research led by ONS
- Parallel projects at NRS and NISRA
- Range of Research papers by ONS
  - Considered range of methodologies
  - Started from 'admin data first'
- Recommendations from National Statistician and UK Statistics Authority (March 2014)
- Recommendation accepted by government –
   Cabinet Office July 2014





# NISRA position

- Tracked research led by ONS (and NRS)
- Separate work on administrative data (more about this later)
- Northern Ireland position paper in October 2014
- Would be 2021 Census, predominantly online, supported by administrative data
- Three supporting papers





# Northern Ireland supporting papers

- Use of administrative data in population estimates
- Data matching of administrative data
- Online data collection
  - Overview paper





#### Northern Ireland work to date

- Experience of NILS
- Experience of using administrative data in 2011
- Bringing in legislation to give access to other data sets (eg HESA, Electoral Office, and others)
- Work on POINTER
- Role in ADRC





### Tentative way ahead

- Move towards administrative data-based population estimates – maybe before 2021?
- Development of better Census Address Register (address frame)
- Pre-populated with basic details (age, sex) of usual residents (with indicator of robustness)
- Overwrite / validate the pre-populated details as Census returns come in





#### 2021 Census - overview

- There will be a 2021 Census
- 'Predominantly' online
- Consultation starting later in 2015 (topics)
- EU Regulation expected essentially unchanged from 2011
- Subject to Assembly legislation Census Order and Regulations (passed in 2010 for 2011 Census)

# **CAG – Scope (2006)**

The Census Act (Northern Ireland) 1969 enables the Registrar General to make the arrangements necessary to carry out the census in Northern Ireland and to prosecute individuals who fail to comply. However, throughout the preparations for and conduct of the Census, Census Office seeks to maintain contact with its users through regular meetings of the Northern Ireland Census Advisory Group (CAG).

The group is made up of interested users and specialist advisors drawn from central and local government, health authorities and the commercial and academic sectors as well as representatives from specialist agencies, charities and voluntary organisations.

It provides advice on a wide range of census topics including the development and testing of questions, changes in definitions and classifications as well as methodological developments such as census under enumeration and the Census Coverage Survey.





# CAG – Terms of Reference (2006)

To advise the NI Census Office on all matters relating to the conduct of the decennial census of population and housing in Northern Ireland under the Census Act (Northern Ireland) 1969.

This will include issues such as development of questions, definitions and classifications and methodological developments.
